


FDLRS IMPACT DATA

The FDLRS Network maintains an Impact Database which provides a means to aggregate student impact data on major professional learning activities. Educators participating in select FDLRS Associate Center activities are asked to gather pre and post data related to student performance in conjunction with the professional development or technical support they receive. The database then provides individual centers with cumulative data by which to measure the impact of the deliverable based on pre and post tests.

The chart (right) indicates the average effect size following a teacher implemented professional learning opportunity offered by FDLRS.





FDLRS MULTIDISCIPLINARY CENTERS

There are six regional Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resources (FDLRS) Multidisciplinary Educational Services Centers in Florida that are funded by the State of Florida through the Department of Education, Bureau of Exceptional Education and Student Services (BEESS), to serve Florida's at-risk children and youth, their families and schools. They are a unique resource for students, families and school districts providing multidisciplinary evaluation and consultation services for children and youth at-risk for or identified as having complex medical, educational, socio-emotional, and/or behavioral problems. The centers also provide support services and inservice/pre-service training for educators and other professionals.













FDLRS SPECIALIZED CENTERS



Florida Instructional Materials Center for the Visually Impaired (FIMC-VI) is a statewide resource center designed to assist schools in obtaining specialized materials for students with visual impairments.

The Resource Materials and Technology Center for the Deaf/Hard of Hearing (RMTC:D/HH) is a statewide discretionary project that supports the education of students who are Deaf/Hard of Hearing in Florida.
